At seventeen he matriculated in the university as a student of law and philosophy. Here again he did little studying and much reading. In his reading at that period he busied himself much with dramatic literature and wrote a parody on the Eneid, called significantly *Main Traum*. Carried away by the storm and stress of Schiller's early dramas, he wrote a palpable imitation of Don Carlos in his *Blanka van Kastilien* a long play which shows decided dramatic talent; but while the exposition is excellent, the development of the plot is obscure and prolix. The penultimate novel in the *Strangers and Brothers* series takes Goya's theme of monsters that appear in our sleep. The sleep of reason here is embodied in the ghastly murders of children that involve torture and sadism.

Biblical Masculinities Foregrounded - Ovidiu Creanga 2017-10-26

Ovidiu Creanga opens the volume with a critical appraisal of the current state of play in the field, while Martti Nissinen and Bjorn Krondorfer offer closing critical reflections that situate the book's topics within broader debates regarding masculinities in religious studies.

If gender does make a difference, how might this be defined? These are the key questions posed in this collection of essays, by some 30 authors from the following countries; Argentina, Cambodia, Canada, England, France, Germany, India, Israel, Italy, Ivory Coast, Japan, Kenya, the Netherlands, the Philippines, South Africa, Switzerland, Syria and the United States. The contributions draw on various theoretical approaches, including gender, feminist and

sociological theories. The book's pressing topicality is underlined by the fact that well into the modern era male opposition to women's admission to, and progress within, the judicial profession has been largely based on the argument that their very gender programmes women to show empathy, partiality and gendered prejudice - in short essential qualities running directly counter to the need for judicial objectivity.
