The Crisis of Democratic Capitalism - Martin Wolf 2023-02-02

Rethinking European Integration History in Light of Capitalism - Aurélie D. Andry 2022-06-01

This book outlines the possibilities and perspectives of an intertwining of European integration historiography with the history and concept of capitalism. Although debates on capitalism have been making a comeback since the 2008 crisis, to date the concept of capitalism remains almost completely avoided by historians of European integration. This book thus conceptualizes 'capitalism' as a useful analytical tool that should be
