Little Women is a novel by American author Louisa May Alcott (1832-1888), which was originally published in two volumes in 1868 and 1869. Alcott wrote the books over several months at the request of her publisher. Following the lives of the four March sisters-Meg, Jo, Beth and Amy-the novel details their passage from childhood to womanhood and is loosely based on the author and her three sisters. Little Women was an immediate commercial and critical success with readers demanding to know more about the characters. Alcott quickly completed a second volume (entitled *Good Wives in the United Kingdom*, although this name originated from the publisher and not from Alcott). It was also successful. The two volumes were issued in 1880 as a single novel entitled *Little Women*. Alcott wrote two sequels to her popular work, both of which also featured the March sisters: *Little Men* (1871) and *Jo's Boys* (1886). Although *Little Women* was a novel for girls, it differed notably from the current writings for children, especially girls. The novel addressed three major themes:

"domesticity, work, and true love, all of them interdependent and each necessary to the achievement of its heroine's individual identity."

Today, Rioux sees the novel's beating heart in Alcott's portrayal of family resilience and her honest look at the struggles of girls growing into women. In gauging its current status, Rioux shows why *Little Women* remains a book with such power that people carry its characters and spirit throughout their lives.

Louisa May Alcott (1832 - 1888) was an

part of Little Women: or Meg, Jo, Beth and
Amy (1868), is a semi-autobiographical
account of her childhood with her sisters in
Concord, Massachusetts. Part two, or Part
Second, also known as Good Wives (1869),
followed the March sisters into adulthood
and their respective marriages. Little Men
(1871) detailed Jo's life at the Plumfield
School that she founded with her husband
Professor Bhaer at the conclusion of Part
Two of Little Women. And Jo's Boys (1886)
completed the "March Family Saga". Alcott
made women's rights integral to her stories,
and her fiction became her "most important
feminist contribution" — even considering
all the efforts Alcott made to help facilitate
women's rights during her lifetime.
